We do not preach only one coming of Christ, but a second as well, much more glorious than the first. The first coming was marked by patience; the second will bring the crown of a divine kingdom.



Annunciation of the Mother of God Byzantine Catholic Parish

In all decisions regarding parish membership and Sacramental life, the pastor exercises the final decision and the confidentiality of the persons involved must be respected.

Parish Membership is determined by three things:

- 1. Being registered in the parish for a sufficient amount of time
- Faithful and consistent participation in the liturgical life of the parish especially on Sundays and Holy days.
- Regular financial support of the parish. Use of offertory envelopes by parish members is required for weekly donations

The Sacred Mysteries of Baptism, Chrismation and Matrimony are available only to those persons who comply with the above requirements of parish membership.

<u>A Biblically based stewardship</u> is part of the vision of Annunciation parish. Parishioners are encouraged to practicing tithing and also to consider Annunciation parish in planned giving such as trust funds, etc.

Couples who are planning to be married at Annunciation parish must be free to be married in the Church and must contact the pastor at least six months prior to their proposed wedding date. Persons applying for annulments of a previous marriage should not set a Church wedding date unless their annulment has been granted.

<u>Couples who are cohabitating or involved in same sex civil unions or so-called same</u> <u>sex "marriages,</u>" as well as couples who are contracepting are asked to seek the pastor's help in understanding the Church's teaching and in conforming their lives to the moral teaching of the Church. Such persons **cannot receive Holy Communion** until their lives are reconciled with the Church.

Parish members entering the hospital or who are home-bound should contact the pastor or parish business office.

Prior to undergoing surgery or going under anesthesia parish members should contact the pastor.

No eulogies or public addresses by laity are permitted during funeral services.

<u>Cremation is permitted but not encouraged</u>. Ashes are not permitted in the church. Funeral services with the body of the deceased in the church must take place prior to cremation. Ashes are to be buried according to the burial rite of the Church. Ashes cannot be scattered or kept in homes.

<u>Appropriate behavior and dress</u> are required for all liturgical services. No audible conversations, or waving across the church. Electronic devices must be turned off. No food, candy, or gum chewing. Dress code is formal and modest for all services.

Abstinence from meat is to be observed every Friday. If this is not possible an equivalent penitential practice is to be observed.



Today we eat meat products for the last time as we approach Lent. The theme today is also the Last Judgment when Christ will come again to judge the living and the dead. The criterion for our judgment will be the rule of love. Did we love as God loved? Did we forgive others as God forgave us?

Clean Week

Sunday, March 2nd - Cheesefare Sunday

Having given up meat products last week, today we eat dairy products for the last time as we enter the "Great Fast" (Lent) in stages.

At the start of the Great Fast, the Church reminds us of Adam's expulsion from Paradise. God commanded Adam to fast (Gen 2:16), but he did not obey. Because of their disobedience, Adam and Eve were cast out of Eden and lost the life of blessedness, knowledge of God, and communion with Him, for which they were created. Both they and their descendants became heirs of death and corruption. On this Sunday, we should consider the benefits of fasting, the consequences of disobedience, and recall our fallen state. Above all we focus on forgiveness and officially begin Lent with the Forgiveness.

Our fasting should not be a negative thing, a mere abstention from certain foods. It is an opportunity to free ourselves from the sinful desires and urges of our fallen nature, to restore a more sacramental vision and approach to physical things (food, etc.), and to nourish our souls with prayer, repentance, Confession, participation in church services, and partaking of the life-giving Mysteries of Christ.

The First Week of Great and Holy Lent has been traditionally called Clean Week in the Byzantine Catholic and Orthodox Churches. It is a time for us to "kick start" our Lenten Journey where we fast from foods and from sin in order to prepare ourselves to fully enter into Christ's saving death and resurrection. Join us this week as we begin our Lenten Journey with some communal penitential prayer. For the first three evenings of Clean Week, starting at 7pm, we will pray a portion of the Canon of St. Andrew of Crete, which will set the tone for the rest of our Lenten Journey. This service will be done again but in its entirety on the Thursday of the 5th week of Lent. The services each evening during this first week of Lent will last about an hour.

Forgiveness Vespers Sunday, March 2nd 1:30PM

This service marks the beginning of the Great Fast where we commemorate the expulsion of Adam and Eve from Paradise, entering into the Lenten fast in remembrance of mankind's separation from God through disobeying his commandment to fast from the fruit of the tree.

Before we enter the Lenten fast, we are reminded that there can be no true fast, no genuine repentance, no reconciliation with God, unless we are at the same time reconciled with one another. A fast without mutual love is a fast of demons. We do not travel the road of Lent as isolated individuals but as members of a family.

The Great Fast as Our Annual Renewal Renewing our understanding of the Old Testament

During the forty days before baptism, the catechumens received daily instruction in the Faith - particularly readings from the Old Testament, with an explanation of God's works among the Jewish people, their expectation of a Messiah, and how this expectation was fulfilled in the coming of Jesus Christ. They were taught how to pray, and how to conduct themselves according to Christian ideals. The rest of the faithful were encouraged to take part in these spiritual exercises as well.

This is why the Great Fast is not only a renewal of our respect for baptism, but also of our connection with the Old Testament. Each day, at Vespers, we hear lessons from the historical and wisdom books of the Old Testament (particularly Genesis, Exodus, and Proverbs). At the Sixth Hour (noonday prayer), we listen to prophecies of the Messiah (from Isaiah and Job) and his suffering and eventual glorification.
